

# Rabbi Art's thoughts

As Chanukah approaches, we reach the darkest days of the year. We'll light the candles, and we'll celebrate the victory of Maccabees. But there's another story that I want to tell you – a story that happened almost 400 years after the Maccabee's rebellion.

A group of rabbis were sitting around debating what kind of wicks can be used in Shabbat candles. And eventually, the conversation died down. It seemed as if every possible argument had been considered.

But there was one rabbi who just loved debating, so he started another discussion. "The rules for Chanukah candles are different," he said. And before he could start another debate, another rabbi jumped in. "Why do we



celebrate Chanukah?" he asked.

And this was the answer he gave: When the Greeks entered the Temple, they polluted all the oils in the Temple, and when the Hasmonean dynasty overcame and defeated them, they checked and they found but one cruse of oil that was set in place with the seal of the High Priest. There was in only enough to light a single day. A miracle happened, and the lit from it for eight days. The following year the Sages fix those days, making them holidays for praise and thanksgiving.

Those lines I just quoted come from the Talmud – a forty two volume collection of Jewish law. All we know about Chanukah, all we know about the oil and

the miracle comes from that one little paragraph. And that story has given us hope for hundreds of generations.

In the end, Judaism is not about the laws, and it's not about the customs. Judaism is about the stories we tell each other – stories about hope, stories about miracles, stories about love and kindness. And somewhere in that story of the menorah, there's a powerful truth.

"We live in a time," said one Chassidic master, "when that cruse of holy oil is gone. But God placed a drop of holy oil in the heart of every Jew. And as long as we have that drop of oil within us, we can create light for each other."

The story of the menorah, the story that ancient rabbi created, is a story about every Jew who ever lived. And it's a story about you.

All of us have stories. All of us have stories of times when the world seemed dark, and then suddenly there was a miracle, and the light was there.

And there are thousands of stories out there – chicken soup, in effect, for the Jewish soul.

I'd love to get together with you – to share stories, to laugh, to schmooze, and to share those moments of hope. So I've set up two sessions on Zoom, one this month and another in January (details in the Calendar of Events in this newsletter). I'll bring a couple of stories that are touching and warm, and we'll see where they take us. And we'll find strength and warmth together.

Once again the Jewish people get to rejoice in our victory over the oppressors. The Macabees stood their ground against the Syrians, and notwithstanding the destruction of the temple, they were able to rebuild by the glow of the fire from the oil that lasted, not one, but eight days!

Despite not being allowed to study, the Macabees devised a game (dreidel) to practice their Hebrew. Who doesn't love a good reason to celebrate, especially when chocolate coins are involved?

At the end of this month, I will be
