

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
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A note from Rabbi Niles

Dear friends,

It's good to be home! I'm back in Napa after a whirlwind final month of travel and service. This is the final week of my sabbatical, and I very much look forward to seeing all of you again after MLK Day and in the weeks and months ahead for Shabbat services, religious school, and our other Congregation Beth Shalom programs.



After celebrating the beginning of Chanukah at Beth Shalom, Carolyn and I traveled to Chicago to spend quality time with our parents and extended family and friends. As we all get older, I cherish the time we have with our loved ones. Chicago is where we were born and grew up, and we enjoyed returning to some of our favorite places.

My next stop was the FBI Academy in Quantico, Virginia, to serve as the resident chaplain on the base. This visit was rescheduled from the fall because of the government shutdown. I was at the academy for nearly two weeks, and it was a unique and memorable experience.

My job was, in some ways, similar to the job of any rabbi in a congregation, to practice a "ministry of presence." I was on call to be available and accessible to cadets, special agents, and other law enforcement officers during their training at Quantico to offer spiritual and emotional support.

Yet in other respects, my job there was very different. Training to become an FBI agent is unique and at times quite challenging, like military boot camp. Students attend academic classes and lectures (on subjects like search warrants, use of force, and interrogations), but they also learn about firearms, tactical driving, breaching a home, making arrests, defensive tactics,

and hostage rescue. I personally attended all of these classes with the students and instructors and found them interesting and informative.

In addition to leading several study sessions and interfaith services, I counseled students who were going through personal challenges during this stressful training process and tried my best to offer support and guidance. While some of their issues were shared by most people, others were unique because of their context at the academy. In retrospect, the future agents I met were driven, committed, and impressive.

I've worked as a chaplain with law enforcement, including Napa PD, for many years. While morale is not always high these days because of the current political situation in our country, I have renewed faith in the next generation of agents and officers. It is not just about building cases and putting away criminals, but about creating a safe and just society—one of the most fundamental and ancient of Jewish values.

As I near the end of my sabbatical, I want to again thank everyone at Beth Shalom—from our board leadership to

our kids—for granting me this time of rest, renewal, and growth. I am a better rabbi because of it.


Rabbi Art's thoughts

I've done a lot for the Jewish people. In the 1970's, when the persecution of Soviet Jews was at its worst, I went to Moscow to arrange for the release of one of the Jewish leaders. And eventually, when there was no other way to obtain his freedom, I broke into a KGB office.

In the 1990's, when I was president of my synagogue, there was a series of antisemitic fire- bombings. For a year, the FBI had undercover agents outside my house and my office because there were credible threats against my life.

But I've never seen a moment like this one. Friday night, when I got back to my hotel after leading services, there was a Facebook post from the rabbis and cantors in Minnesota. There is fear and there is horror, they wrote:

And alongside that horror is resolve to take action - as individuals and as a collective - to bear witness and make



a difference. Right now we witness agents from Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and Customs and Border Protection (CBP) wreaking havoc across our state. These actions have no home here. This is not what we know to be good and right as Minnesotans across the political spectrum who protect each other, the stranger in our midst, and our shared human dignity.

My colleagues in Minnesota – including a close friend from rabbinical school – will be marching on Thursday and Friday. And in the invitation to join the march, they wrote this:

We have to advise you that right now, Minnesota is not safe for anyone.

Hug your kids. Be kind to each other

As my colleagues in Minnesota wrote:
*O God, Help us uphold our sacred duty
to care for one another, for the stranger
and the needy among us. And may our
cities and State be a place where
people of every background and belief
know safety, dignity, and peace.*

Taking a step into faith

As the great Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. once said, “Faith is taking the first step even when you don't see the whole staircase.” I feel this sentence holds true for much of what happens at Congregation Beth Shalom.

Currently, the Ad Hoc Strategic Planning Committee is finalizing its recommendations to the board about the next 3-5 years. Much of what they propose is going to have to be done with a bit of faith, since it will take time before the “staircases” they are proposing take shape.

At the end of February, we will have *A Night at the Cabaret* fundraiser. This started as just an idea, and the faith that the committee, who have worked tirelessly to pull it together for the past months would iron out all the details over the time leading up to the event. Their faith is paying off, and there is still time to buy your ticket for the event on February 28th.



First Friday Family services are a work in progress. I have faith that we will come up with a program that showcases the talents of our religious school students. It will also incorporate them into the service so that they can gain from the real life experience of being at a service, prepare for their B'nei Mitzvah and beyond in learning how to get up and lead in front of a crowd, and create a community of families that come together to take a pause once a week at Shabbat services. This, like everything else we do, is a work in progress. We won't get it right on the first stab, and maybe not that many will show up the first time we do it, but we must have faith and take the first steps despite it not yet

being a fully formed program.

At Shabbat services, I know personally, I like to believe that I have faith in a g-d, despite not being able to see him or her, or knowing their whole plan for me, for the world, for anything. I am a person who likes to know things. I play the “what if” game a lot in my head in order to be prepared in different scenarios.

As we do with many things at Beth Shalom, we have to have faith that our combined efforts will serve to maintain a thriving synagogue and Jewish community.

While I have faith, I also know that there needs to be action. I am sure Dr. King would agree with me that staircases don't just build themselves. I look forward to building many staircases with you at Beth Shalom.
